

By-Laws

Article I, Duties of Officers — Section 1 — Duties of the President: The President shall preside at all meetings of the student body and of the student council. He shall have power to appoint all committees. In case of a tie, the President has the privilege of voting. He shall perform all other duties incident to the office.

Section 2 — Duties of the Vice-President: The Vice-President shall assume the duties of the president in case of temporary absence or upon request. The Vice-President shall perform all duties incident to that office.

Section 3 — Duties of the Secretary-Treasurer: The Secretary-Treasurer shall keep a record of all meetings of the student council. He shall give notices of the meetings and carry on all necessary correspondence. He shall keep an accurate account of all income and expenditures of the council. He shall make a full report at the end of each semester. His books must be audited by a committee of student council members appointed by the president. This committee shall be supervised by the faculty auditing committee.

Section 4 — The Reporter shall be responsible for the publicity of the organization. He shall see that the school paper and the local newspapers are kept informed of student council activities.

Section 5 — The Parliamentarian shall see that all meetings of the council and the student body are conducted according to parliamentary procedure.

Article II, Duties of Student Council — Section 1 — It shall be the duty of the Student Council to study and promote the best interests of the school. In it shall be vested the legislative and executive powers of the Student Co-operative Association.

Section 2 — The Council shall hold regular meetings. The time and place of meetings shall be decided upon by the Council and faculty advisor. No meetings shall be held without the presence of the faculty advisor or another faculty member appointed by the principal.

Section 3 — The Council must vote two-thirds majority to amend the constitution. This recommendation shall be carried to the faculty by the sponsor. Before the amendment is voted upon by the student body, the faculty must approve it. There must be a two-thirds vote of the student body to amend the constitution.

Article III, Constitution and By-Laws — Section 1 — The Constitution and By-Laws go into effect when adopted by three-fourths majority of the members of the Dublin High School Student Co-operative Association.

Section 2 — This Constitution and By-Laws may be amended by vote of two-thirds of the student body upon recommendation of the student council and sanction of the faculty.

CLUBS

Key Club — The Key Club is a service organization, sponsored by the Fairlawn Kiwanis Club, whose membership is open to Junior and Senior boys. Mem-

bers are elected in the spring. To be eligible for membership, a student must have a "C" average or better and be interested in service — community and school. The maximum membership shall not exceed 30 members at any time.

F.H.A. — The Dublin Chapter of the Future Homemakers of America was formed to carry out the aims and purposes of the Homemaking program. They are to develop those personal qualities within its members necessary for successful living in the home, school and community. Open to girls who have had or are taking Home Economics in grades 8-12.

F.T.A. — The John Preston McConnell Future Teachers of America Club was formed in 1950. The purpose of the F.T.A. is to learn about the opportunities in teaching, to cultivate the qualities essential in a good teacher, to study the lives of great teachers, and to foster the development of student leadership. Open to students in grades 11 and 12 who are interested in the teaching profession. Students must have and maintain a "C" average or above.

Beta Club — The National Beta Club is a national student service club whose objectives are:

- (1) To promote citizenship and leadership.
- (2) To encourage fellowship and cooperation.
- (3) To reward effort and achievement.
- (4) To inspire honesty and tolerance.
- (5) To encourage and assist students to continue education after high school graduation.

Open to Juniors and Seniors with an average of B or above.

F.F.A. — The Dublin Chapter of the F.F.A. is an organization open to all boys taking Vocational Agriculture. Members learn how to conduct and take part in public meetings, to speak in public, to buy and sell cooperatively, and to be good citizens in their communities. It tends to promote and develop leadership, character, sportsmanship, thrift, scholarship, improved agriculture, and patriotism.

Many activities and contests are entered each year on a federation, district and state basis.

Bi-Phy-Chem — This club is composed of students whose main interests are scientific.

Students currently enrolled in science subjects are invited to join in order to learn more of the opportunities in science. Meetings are centered about field trips, demonstrations of a scientific nature, experimentation, and historical figures in science. The science fair is a project of this club.

Library — This is a club for those interested in reading and library activities. It is designed to stimulate reading interests, to improve our library program, and to encourage library interests as a career.

The **Tri-Hi-Y** is a Christian service club for girls which is sponsored by the Pulaski YMCA. The Tri-Hi-Y consists of four individual clubs — Freshman, Sophomore, Junior and Senior.
